

Key Towns/Villages/ Communications

Surrey Heath constituency is made up of Camberley (the main town), Frimley, and the hamlets/villages of Frimley Green, Mytchett and Deepcut to the west, Ash, Ash Vale and Tongham to the south, and Bagshot, Lightwater, Windlesham, Chobham, West End and Bisley to the east. It is served by two SW Train services to Waterloo, Guildford and the south coast, as well as a Thameslink Trains service from Reading to Gatwick. There are also local bus services as well as a motorway bus service from Camberley to Victoria Coach Station. The A30 and M3 serve the north of the constituency and the A3/A31 is to the south. The two routes are connected by the Blackwater Valley Road (A325) to the west and the A322 to the east as well as a network of country roads.

Parliamentary Constituency

The seat was created in 1997 from the most part of <u>North West Surrey</u>, a seat that was abolished, and smaller parts of <u>Woking</u> and <u>Guildford</u>, seats that remain.

On its creation, <u>Nick Hawkins</u> was elected to parliament as Surrey Heath's MP, after <u>Michael Grylls</u>, who had in 1992 achieved a majority of 28,392, retired.^[1] One of Hawkins' opponents for selection was future <u>Speaker John Bercow</u>, selected for <u>Buckingham</u> the same day.^[2]

The <u>Conservative</u> constituency association, then the richest in the country, deselected Hawkins for the next election, following accusations of racism, in the hope of obtaining an MP of cabinet calibre.^{[5][6]}

The MP since 2005, <u>Michael Gove</u>, saw his longest spell as a Secretary of State in the education brief and is the current <u>Secretary of State for Levelling Up</u>, <u>Housing</u> <u>and Communities</u>.

Local Government

The Local Government Borough was formed on 1 April 1974 under the Local <u>Government Act 1972</u>, as a merger of <u>Frimley and Camberley Urban District</u>, and Bagshot Rural District. The <u>Borough</u> acquired its name because it includes extensive areas of <u>heath</u> and woodland including <u>Chobham Common</u> and Lightwater Country Park.

Surrey Heath Liberal Democrats

The local party has some 160 members plus some 40 additional supporters. It is managed by an Executive and there are no branch parties.

The party has been very active in recent years and has made considerable progress in a constituency which was said to be the most right-wing in the UK in 2014.
